Jesus said, "Who among you wouldn't leave the 99? Who among you wouldn't look for the one?" Someone in the crowd probably rolled their eyes. Someone squirmed and looked at their palms. Someone sighed and thought to themselves, "This man doesn't understand the business. What fool would leave 99 to look for one?" But maybe God was not talking about us. Maybe God was talking about her own reckless love. Maybe God was talking about her own willingness to turn the world upside down for me.

REFUGEE APPEAL: Iskashitaa Refugee Network has alerted St. Mark's about an urgent need for a refugee family in Tucson. St. Mark's Session supports this appeal. The information about the family is below. Please consider contributing as you are able.

The Family: The 8 member Congolese Lubunga family arrived December 23, 2024 in time to celbrate Christmas in two partially furnished apartments off 29th Street but only weeks before we would know the devastating changes the new administration would have on Refugee Resettlement nationally and globally. The Lugunga family were warehoused and survived 25 years living ina Rwandan refugee camp after fleeing the DRC/Burundi, a region still extremely unstable today. Mr. Lubunga fortunately trained as a Biology and chemistry teacher and educated his children ages 19-30 years in the camp. Although the family all speaks some level of very timid shy English, the cultural shock and adjustment is unimaginable for the young adults that know nothing but life in a refugee camp. Their resettlement agency, whose ORR funding has been frozen and ranks have been hit hard and has had to pivot and serve the families for less than the healthy 6 months that refugees have been supported in the past. Iskashitaa has set up a separate account to assist the family needs. Their lease is until the end of June when they could move to a 2-3 bedroom rental house for a new beginning at less than \$2600 monthly housing expenses. All members of the family are eligible to work now although Noelle, the youngest, is enrolled in high school. They are still going through cultural orientation and adapting. They use the bus, and Iskashitaa has provided them with four good bicycles. But they continue to work on job readiness and are getting assistance from the agency with those endeavors. The apartments are now furnished and they have sufficient food through Iskashitaa Refugee Network and the EBT program. They have eagerly been volunteering and harvesting several times a week.

What are we asking for:

- rent assistance from now until the end of June
- any leads for entry level or higher employment
- a house to rent starting after June 30th that shall be cared for by many helping hands.

The family has never lived under more than one roof (maybe not in more than one room for that matter) so the size of the house should not be a deterrent if it is only 2-3 bedrooms.


